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- IV. **Abstract:** Wyoming's program management efforts are integral with those of other Program partners to ensure that timely and effective coordination, planning and implementation of Recovery Program actions occurs. Our participation on each committee and at each level of program conduct will continue as long as there is a Program. Progress towards accomplishing the Program's dual objectives of recovery of the endangered fish while water development continues in compliance with the ESA continues to incrementally occur. Wyoming's representatives participated in meetings, teleconferences and decision-making; actively made suggestions and recommendations and met our reporting commitments. We actively sought to secure understanding, acceptance and support of the Program by Wyoming governmental agencies, the Congress and the Administration for capital construction and annual program funding from the State of Wyoming, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. Effective program management remains exceedingly important and is on the critical path for our Program's progress to accomplishing species' downlisting and recovery by 2023.
- V. **Study Schedule:** 1989-ongoing. Fiscal year 2013 was the twentieth (20th) year during which Wyoming received in-kind services credit for our program management efforts.¹

- VII. **Accomplishment of FY 2013 Tasks and Deliverables, Discussion of Initial Findings and Shortcomings:** The Biology Committee's efforts are significant and have been extremely important in our innovative recovery program's successes over the past twenty-three years that the committee has existed. A considerable work load is undertaken and accomplished annually by this Committee. Pete Cavalli is an active and respected participant in all of the BC's efforts.

¹ Pursuant to the Recovery Program's 2009 Extension of the Cooperative Agreement (which continues the Recovery Program through September 30, 2023), Wyoming will continue to request in-kind credit for our personnel's direct participation in program management and administration involvement and actions.

John Shields served as a member of the Water Acquisition and Information and Education Committees and as Chairman of the Management Committee during Fiscal Year 2013. He led logistical efforts for the recovery programs' annual Congressional briefings trip to Washington, DC on March 19-22, 2013.

Accomplishments: Due to the efforts of all program participants, including the involved Wyoming personnel, this recovery program continues to proceed forward and incremental progress is being made towards downlisting and delisting of the four endangered fish species. Wyoming's policy and technical positions on Recovery Program activities were adequately coordinated; Wyoming was ably represented at each of the program's committee levels; and the program's guidance, biennial budget, recovery action plan and work plan documents were developed, approved and continue to be implemented.

Discussion of Initial Findings, Highlights, Shortcomings and Noteworthy Activities: None of our efforts are getting any easier. The process of getting to a satisfactory sufficient progress determination memo this year is a prime example. The fact that we had to report to Congress this past March that we are not on track to downlist the Colorado pikeminnow as previously projected (and written down in prior years' editions of our annual "Program Highlights" document) is certainly a shortcoming and disappointment for all involved in our collaborative partnership. In re noteworthy activities: through a combination of hard work, good fortune and very good luck, legislation (Public Law 113-270) was enacted (January 1, 2013) and signed into law (January 14, 2013) to extend the recovery programs' annual base funding authorization to use Upper Colorado River Basin Fund power revenues pursuant to Public Law 106-392 through the end of fiscal year 2019.

- VIII. **Additional Noteworthy Observations:** As the verbiage commonly found in real estate contracts says, *time is of the essence.*" This phrase is one that we in this program and our sister San Juan Program need to continually bear in mind. The end of fiscal year 2023 will be here before we know it; and it is a self-imposed deadline that has very real significance.

Participation by each Program participant in all aspects of the Recovery Program remains one of the most critical elements of maintaining the trusting and productive working relationships that have been established over the past twenty-five years. We all need to continue to apply "peer-pressure" and "gentle-reminders" to one another as participants to make Program efforts of all kinds – whether Biology, Management or Water Acquisition Committee meetings or participating in the annual Washington, D.C. briefing meetings with Congressional delegation and Department of the Interior staff the high priority that our collective commitments to one another require.

With planning for the Orchard Mesa Irrigation District Canal Automation Project and the Tusher Wash Dam rehabilitation and screening project moving along, we are nearing the end of our capital project construction phase. We need to push on the USDA to make completion of the EIS a priority. *Time is of the essence.*

- IX. **Recommendations:** All program participants need to remain focused on our ultimate objective of recovering the four endangered fish species. Progress is incremental, and staying on track is vitally important to the ultimate success of the Recovery Program. The program participants need to obtain a better mutual understanding of the process and

procedural mechanics of how downlisting is going to proceed so that we are ready to proceed without delay when the opportunity presents itself. We need to begin to conceptualize and start filling in the particulars of what the conservation agreements that will be required to be entered into between the USFWS and the participating states will require. There will be transition challenges to be dealt with and getting a head-start on them could be helpful.

X. **Project Status:** Wyoming's Program Management is considered to be ongoing and on-track. Work and time requirements for report and document review, meetings' preparation and participation (whether in person attending meetings, workshops or the annual researchers' meeting, via conference calls or Web-Ex webinars) commitments for accomplishing the Biology Committee's tasks and functions are significant, in particular for the Program's numerous nonnative fish management and control activities.
